Gary Kennedy, Environmental Services Director, of St. Aloisius Medical Center, is the 2017 North Dakota Environmental Services Association (NDESA) Best Service Award recipient. Gary lives our mission of St. Aloisius every day which is "St. Aloisius inspired by Jesus, in union with the Sisters of Mary of the Presentation, ministers health to all we serve." Gary

has been employed at St. Aloisius just shy of 38 years. He began his career at our facility in maintenance in March of 1979 and became Director of Environmental Services in March of 1986.

Gary has been instrumental in either planning/coordinating or completing several projects over his tenure. Although Gary may not have directly completed the labor on larger projects, he has been the "go between" between the contractors and CEO, along with keeping a 25 Bed Critical Access Hospital, 95 bed long term care and 16 apartment congregate housing unit all functioning efficiently.

Whether it's removing snow after a snowstorm, repairing equipment, attending department meetings or moving cars for a helicopter to land, Gary does the job. One supervisor said "I can say

that in the 34 years I have worked here with Gary, I can't recall him raising his voice or complaining. He has always kept a professional demeanor even in difficult circumstances." Another supervisor said, "He is a man of faith and family."

Gary is a member of NDESA and attends annual meetings at the Long Term Care Association each May. He has attended many sessions related to Life Safety and other environmental services topics to increase his knowledge to the benefit of our organization.

He is currently the Director of our Maintenance, Laundry and Housekeeping departments. He also works closely with our Safety and Risk Manager to keep in compliance with state and federal regulations.

Gary's characteristics that exemplify his dedication and service to the field of environmental services

and St. Aloisius, especially, are his strong faith in God, his commitment to providing for the patients' and residents' needs to the best of his abilities, and his commitment to his St. Aloisius family (staff).

Hagemeister to complete PMHNP certification this summer

Erin Hagemeister, board certified as a Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) for the past 13 years, will be completing board certification as a Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner (PMHNP) this summer. A nurse practitioner is a registered nurse who has completed additional study and training at either the master's or doctoral level and is licensed to diagnose and treat health conditions, including medication management. Nurse practitioners are trained and certified in a specialty area; specialties for nurse practitioners include Family Practice, Pediatrics, Women's health, Neonatology, Acute Care, Adult/Gerontology, Oncology and Psychiatric Mental Health.

A PMHNP is an advanced practice registered nurse specialist who is trained to assess and diagnose mental health issues as well as do

medication management and some therapy. PMHNPs can see individuals, families and groups, and work in a wide range of practice settings including outpatient clinics, private practices, community health centers, hospitals, substance abuse programs and correctional facilities. They can work with all ages including children and adolescents. Diagnoses that PMHNPs

frequently manage include, but are not limited to, depression, anxiety, psychosis, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, dementia, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), personality disorders and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder

(ADHD).

Clients can be referred to PMHNPs by their primary care providers, by therapists and counselors, by teachers or other school personnel, as well as family members and self-referral.


"Caring Together" to benefit the whole community is our goal at St. Aloisius Medical Center. We look forward to visiting with you at the health fair.

Population Health Improvement Activity Grant received

St. Aloisius Medical Center is a Critical Access Hospital in central rural North Dakota. Our healthcare system serves the counties of Wells, Pierce, McHenry, Foster, Sheridan and Benson. In our service area we have experienced 12 completed suicides in the past five years including teens, young adults and adults. Our 2016 Community Needs assessment identified mental health as a significant need for our community and service area. We have received the Population Health Improvement Activity Grant Program for \$5,000 to address mental health in our area.

Our sponsors and champions include St. Aloisius Medical Center, Harvey Chamber of Commerce, Wells County District Health, First Lutheran Church, New Life on Main Church, Hinrichs Super Valu and the New Rockford Community Cares organization.

Each of these groups are active members of the Community Cares Coalition, which is chaired by the St. Aloisius community liaison coordinator. The Rural Mental Health Consortium (RMHC) will

be an added partner with this project.

Anticipated outcomes are to introduce new Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner, Erin Hagemester, to our RMHC and Harvey area in May 2017. Erin is currently a Family Practice Nurse Practitioner in the Harvey and Fessenden clinic and will complete her training in May. Although the RMHC has existed since 1991 in the Harvey area, we are aware that our population struggles to find resources needed.

An additional outcome is to change the culture and decrease the STIGMA of mental illness in the Harvey area. In the past five years, St. Aloisius Medical Center Community liaison, Beth Huseth, has spoken on the local radio station (KHND) weekly and now monthly addressing mental health issues. Our grant has taken this one step further by spending time between January 2017 and June 2017 in local coffee shops inviting people to a safe place that allows sharing and discussion of mental health concerns in our communities.



In 2013 a group of interested community members began a coalition to address suicide prevention in Harvey. Since that beginning we've partnered with Wells County District Health to expand our coalition to include underage drinking and substance abuse for all ages.

Some of the events that have been held are: Tree lighting during Christmas holiday to LIGHT the DARKNESS, Suicide survivor events including movies at Central Cinema Theater, motorcycle run, 3000 suicide # and Text # magnets distributed, and they have worked with community of New Rockford to develop their own Community Cares group.

RMHC committed to mental health in our area since 1991

Rural Mental Health Consortium (RMHC) provides Mental Health services to the communities of Harvey, Kenmare and Minot.

How it began . . . 1991 the CEO of each of these healthcare facilities identified the mental health needs in our rural central area. We began with education to staff in our healthcare systems and then expanded by providing a psychiatrist and then a Clinical Nurse Specialist in Psychiatric Care.

Currently, Zane Zuleger CNS in children, adolescent and adult psychiatric care serves the Harvey area. Appointments can be made through St. Aloisius RMHC liaison, Donna Corneliusen. Erin Hagemester NP is completing her NP in psychiatric care at the University of North Dakota. She will be part of the RMHC Team.

Currently, the RMHC board which is represented by the CEO of the healthcare center meets quarterly and is diligent about providing services in the rural area. Mike Zwicker, CEO at St. Aloisius Medical Center and RMHC board member, is learning about this important program.

The good news is that 26 years ago St. Aloisius identified there was a mental health need in our area. Many of us also understand there is a crisis in North Dakota and the area we are most concerned with is our communities.

Partnership for Success Grant received

Wells County District Health Unit (WCDHU) has been collaborating with St. Aloisius Medical Center on the Partnership for Success Grant. WCDHU is one of eight local public health agencies that was given the opportunity to address underage alcohol use due to high statistics of youth involvement in underage drinking. Did you know that in North Dakota 30.8% of youth reported current alcohol use within the last 30 days and 17.6% of North Dakota youth have reported current binge drinking? (www.prevention.nd.gov).

Youth who drink alcohol are at an increased risk for participating in risky behaviors such as drinking and driving, unprotected sexual activity and violence. The Surgeon's general report on addiction stated that research has shown that brain development is not complete until around the age of 25 years old (www.prevention.nd.gov). Substance use among youth has been linked to increased mental health illness and increased risk for addiction. Through our collaboration, we aim to change behaviors and social norms relating to alcohol use among youth and increase the health and well-being of the youth in our community. St. Aloisius Community Benefit Report 2016

In order to report its benefits to the community, St. Aloisius prepares an annual Community Benefit Report which is required to be attached to our IRS 990 Tax return with the Schedule H. During our fiscal year ending 9-30-16, St. Aloisius provided \$307,986 in community benefits/non-compensated benefits.

RESPONDING TO THE NEEDS OF THE POOR

Our Charity Care Program which provides assistance to those with a financial need or catastrophic medical event provided \$2,071 gross charity care.

Other costs of unreimbursed public programs, such as Medical Assistance, totaled \$188,489 during the past year.

BENEFITS FOR THE BROADER COMMUNITY

St. Aloisius is very supportive of community organizations. The following are some examples of services St. Aloisius has provided to the community at large:

- We provide meeting room space for community members and groups.
- We provide office space (in

kind) for Public Health and Rural Mental Health Consortium staff/clients in our outpatient services building. There were 153 people served with 636 encounters for mental health services.

- We sponsor monthly radio spots where health issues are addressed.

- We have 24/7 Pastoral Care services.

- We provided our Wellness program for the community in our cardiac wellness center. This year there were 319 clients for 2,063 encounters.

- We provided lab wellness to the community with 1,013 patients this past year.

- We provided Suicide prevention education to the public schools in the county and work with the Community Cares about Suicide Prevention group

- Outdated supplies are sent to local missionaries for distribution world wide

Alcohol related deaths in ND

According to current statistics, there are more alcohol related deaths in the USA than deaths resulting from illegal drugs. AND . . . North Dakota is called the BEER BELLY of the NATION.

Studies have shown that if the first alcohol drink is taken before age 15 our youth have 4-times the risk of addiction. And . . . One in ten youth drink before age 13 with 60 percent of our youth drinking alcohol before their 21st birthday. These statistics came from the Harvey Risk Youth behavior scores from 2015. **This has been OUR CULTURE, OUR LIVES IN ND but WE CAN MAKE CHANGES!**

Research has shown for every \$1 invested in prevention \$10 is saved in treatment. Every person in the USA is impacted economically by medical costs and court system expenses resulting from youth drinking alcohol which is absorbed through our \$1.4 billion deficit in ND.

The Definition of substance use vs. abuse:

Use: Socially and occasional.

Abuse: too much alcohol or

prescription drugs not recommended by our Primary Care Provider.

Substance abuse controls our lives. This is often related to untreated mental illness.

Research has also demonstrated that underage drinking and adult binge drinking result in more crime, high risk sex and 1 crash every 8.9 hours. Consequences are a lifetime of damaged decision making, learning, memory issues and impulsivity.

WHAT IS Prevention? Developing an environment that promotes well-being.

First step: **Understand the problem**

2nd Bring people together: **Harvey area Community Cares led by St. Aloisius Medical Center**

3rd Plan of ACTION: **City government, schools, medical services, police and County services and sheriff working together to secure a healthy community.**

4th Monitor: **Statistics collected by PFS grant through Wells County District Health Unit and Youth Risk behavior results.**
