FORMATION MINUTE

"To be saints is not a privilege for the few, but a vocation for everyone." - Pope Francis.

The *Code of Canon Law* of the Catholic Church, after laying out all of its specific rules and regulations, ends by reminding the reader that the "supreme law of the Church" is the salvation of souls. Everything that the Church does should have this as its ultimate goal. In the Church's social ministries, such as Catholic health care, however, we can sometimes seem to lose sight of this. Our primary focus tends to be on the physical welfare and wellbeing of our patients and residents, and not their immortal souls. Nevertheless, there are a number of things we do and some things we ought to do which show our concern for the salvation of souls in our ministries.

One way in which we show this concern is in our understanding of holistic care. We often speak proudly of how we care for the whole person and not simply for their physical needs alone. This includes, among other things, the spiritual needs of our patients and residents. We have chaplains who minister in this capacity at all of our ministries; but to limit our understanding of holistic care and the salvation of souls to simply the pastoral care department, I think misses the point. One of the foundational principles of Catholic health care is that we strive to fulfill Jesus' healing mission. When we say this, what we are really saying is that in all that we do, we are showing others what God's love looks like. This is a rather bold statement, but it is what we believe. When others experienced Jesus' love in his healing and care for them, it was a moment of grace in their lives. The physical healing led to a spiritual encounter. So, too, should our ministry be. I'm not saying that we are going around and making other people convert. (Conversion is the work of the Holy Spirit and it must be done freely and without coercion.) What I am saying is that the care we provide, and all that we do, ought to be a moment of grace for others.

But we are imperfect, sinful humans and that often gets in our way of showing Christ's love to others. This is where it is important to remember that our work, especially as a ministry of the Church, is also a means to our own holiness and salvation. When we say in our mission statements that we fulfill the healing mission of Jesus, we aren't simply talking about carrying on his legacy or being inspired by him, as we would any other historical figure. We believe that Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday and is still alive and at work in us and by what we do. The catch is, however, that Jesus won't simply go where he isn't invited. We need to ground our work in prayer and ask Jesus to be present in our ministry. In doing so, we can begin to rely not on our own strengths and talents but on him. As St. Paul says, "it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me" (Gal. 2:20). The more we allow Jesus into our, or rather, *his* ministry, the more we will begin to resemble him in a way unique to each one of us, which is exactly what becoming a saint is.



Did You Know?

Recipients of CARES act funds are only allowed to use the money to prevent, prepare for and respond to the Coronavirus Pandemic. The legal and ethical responsibility to follow the guidelines lays with the administrators of each healthcare facility. Governmental regulations at this time only allow the funding to be used to either reimburse lost revenues or cover direct COVID-19 related expenses.

Unlike other facilities throughout the United States and North Dakota, to date, our Ministry has not been forced to lay-off or furlough members of our team. We are very proud of this. We are tasked with being good stewards of our resources and this includes following infection control guidelines to make the most of our PPE supplies. The country is experiencing a PPE shortage and stewardship directs us to conserve and prepare for future needs regardless of funding ability in the present.

We are healthcare leaders in our area, and everyone in the Ministry has a hand in the quality of care that we provide to patients and residents. Thank you all for your service to our community.

At St. Aloisius Medical Center we are prepared for whatever comes our way. Our Emergency Department has supplies and personal protective equipment needed to care for anyone. We have staff trained in caring for COVID-19 patients.

We screen everyone coming into our ministry and everyone will be masked to prevent any contamination. Vendors are dropping their deliveries outside and our staff are bringing them in the building. If vendors do come in our building, they are screened and must wear a mask.

Repair personnel are allowed into the facility to fix items necessary for patient and resident safety.

Department managers and other partners in this fight meet Monday and Thursday at 8:00 am to discuss any concerns. We begin these meetings with the Mission Statement and prayer. As the situation changes, plans are adjusted to fit the needs.

As plans evolve to allow visitors into LTC and the hospital, serial testing of residents and all staff who are involved in LTC takes place every 10 to 14 days to ensure nobody tests positive for COVID-19.
